## PREVENTION DIVISION

At East Valley Fire we aim to put prevention at the top of our list. As the old adage goes an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. We strive to remain proactive in educating our citizens in the risks involving fire, EMS and other hazards.

As winter is quickly approaching East Valley Firefighters would like to pass on some helpful tips that can help you help prevent injury to yourself and damage to your property.

#### Safety Tips

- Ensure every level of your home has a working smoke alarm and check them monthly.
- Just like smoke alarms test your CO alarms at least once a month.
- Gas and charcoal grills produce CO and should only be used outside


#### Never discard hot ashes inside or near the home or any structures. Place them in a metal container outside.

- be sure not to overload the circuit. Extension cords are not recommended.
- Practice your family's fire escape plan with everyone in the home. If windows are used as an emergency exit practice using them and ensure they are easily opened. Home escape ladders are recommended for second stories.
- If there is a fire hydrant near your home you can assist the fire department by keeping it clear of snow, so in the event it is needed in can be easily located.

### Did You Know?

That your fire department is on duty 24 hours a day 7 days a week? Yes that's right - we have 9 full time firefighters that stay at the station, they work a 48/96 shift which means the crew is there 48 hours straight. There are 3 shifts an "A" "B" and "C" shift that rotate 48 hours at a time to make sure our citizens have the best coverage they can. We respond to all kinds of calls, from structure fires to your simple lift assists, oh and even changing smoke detectors batteries too!
